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A Word from the Minister

Dear Friends

I recently read an article in a scientific magazine in which the writer of the article was discussing how archaeologists can distinguish whether or not an ancient society or culture was civilised. The answer was found in ancient bones and the secrets they contained. In societies or cultures where people were uncivilised and brutal, human remains always showed signs of scarring, of being chipped or cut or hacked by weapons but in more civilised, more advanced societies or cultures, higher up in the earth's strata, there were signs of healing, where people had been cared for by others, their wounds bound and healed.

When I think of church and what church means I think of healing, of a place and a people in which and in whom healing can be found, where brokenness is bound in the name of Jesus. Of course by healing I don't simply mean physical healing, as that may be beyond our reach, but the healing of the soul. I also think of love and peace, that if there's any place or any people where love and peace should be found, it should be in church. People should be able to feel a difference, experience it when they enter a building consecrated to God, when they encounter people who follow Jesus. I am pleased to say at Newhaven Church many people encounter these things, whether at a simple church service, or being part of a group that meets at the church, or utilising our cafe. People have commented on the fact that it's different. We mustn't underestimate how important this is. When Jesus encountered people we always witness certain traits in him. He was always calm, he was always gracious, he was always kind, he always sought to listen and to understand where a person was coming from and because of this people weren't frightened of him. He was always approachable, always willing to take time

with people, and always sought the best for them. He was one who had great authority yet people loved him. Why? Because his authority wasn't derived from holding a position of power whose purpose was to control others, it was built on the foundations of love and humility. People esteemed him, listened to him, followed him, because he cared about them. I find the same traits or qualities in the people of this church and it gives me great joy. There is a willingness to serve others and this is vital. As Colin MacNeill said in his Session Report, I have said that Newhaven is a small congregation that thinks it's a big congregation and this is the case, I believe, because it has a big heart. So thank you for being who you are. Thank you for being teachable and wanting to learn. Thank you for seeking to put into practice the things of Christ. I am privileged and pleased to be your minister and it gives me great joy to serve you.



Now there are many thank you's to offer and I am aware, with my dodgy memory, that if I were to try and thank each person by name, I would undoubtedly leave someone out. So, I want to say thank you to the Session - for your wisdom, your guidance, your love for the congregation, your

friendship, and I want to say thank you to all those in this place who give of their time and energy and love to care for those who are in need. I also want to thank all those who volunteer - in the Sunday School, in the cafe, at the toddler group, at the BB's, at the Guild, at the Haven, and in the various other groups that meet and share fellowship. Thank you too, to all those who make Newhaven Church a part of your lives, who share fellowship in this place, who pray for its wellbeing, who carry it in your hearts. We are nothing without love, we are nothing without each other.

I am looking forward to teaching you in 2014. I am looking forward to discovering, together, more of what it means to follow the Way of Christ. I am looking forward to journeying with each one of you under the guidance of God's Spirit and in the presence of God's love.

Lastly, let us give thanks to God, in whom we live and move and have our being, for all God has given us for we are truly blessed.

Session Report

Some myths about Elders and Kirk Sessions:

- ♦ A significant proportion of Scottish children when asked "*what do you want to be when you grow up*" respond "*an Elder in the Kirk*".
- ♦ When invited to become an Elder, it's the glamour of the role that proves irresistible to most people (think tail coats on Communion Sundays).
- ♦ Elders know every verse in the Bible (and get tested on them at Session meetings).
- ♦ A Kirk Session is like a Soviet style Politburo (think rows of unsmiling elderly gents at party meetings), only more secretive.

Some truths about Elders and Kirk Sessions:

- ♦ Kirk Session meetings are open to all members of the Congregation (except when certain sensitive matters are being discussed).
- ♦ Like all Christians, Elders are pilgrims on a spiritual journey with God, with all the joys and challenges (and sometimes doubts) that such involves.
- ♦ When invited to become an Elder, the opportunity to serve God, and serve their fellow members of the Church, with talents they didn't think they had often strikes people as a privilege and a challenge.
- ♦ Kirk Session meetings are characterised by much laughter (the ones at Newhaven are anyway).
- ♦ Under charity law, the Elders are trustees of the registered charity that is Newhaven Church, with legal duties as such.
- ♦ Sessions got rid of the glamour a long time ago.

While the myths are easy to debunk and the truths are easy to prove, of themselves these don't give us much of a picture of what the Session actually does. The deed of constitution for Newhaven Church puts it like this – the Kirk Session has control of the spiritual and temporal affairs of the Congregation.

To put that in context, let me give a flavour of what the Session does, therefore, by reference to some of the

things that it gets involved in. In 2013 the Session had nine meetings, of which five were regular scheduled meetings, and four were ad hoc meetings, usually held after a Sunday morning service, to deal with specific items that required urgent attention.

Overseeing working groups

Each of the Working Groups reports to the Session, which oversees the Group's actions and, ultimately, takes responsibility for their tasks. Sometimes this involves little more than monitoring what the Group is doing, but in some cases there is a more active role that the Session takes. For example, and as you would expect, the Session has close involvement in the work of the Mission & Outreach Group and the type of activities that it organises. Also, in view of the Elders' role as charity trustees, the Session takes a keen interest in the Church's financial position and seeks to support the work of the Finance & Stewardship Group at every level.

Elders' Districts re-shuffle

Early in 2013, the Session reviewed the make up of Elders' Districts. Over recent years some districts had become quite a bit larger than others because of changes in the members' roll, and there were many people still on the roll who had moved away or with whom contact had been lost. The re-shuffle of the districts will have meant that some members will have new Elders and I hope that new relationships are building up as a result. The Session is very grateful to our Roll-Keeper, Elaine Greig, and to Heather Robertson for their work on the Elders' Districts.

Newhaven Church's financial position

As Peter, our Minister, recently said, Newhaven Church is a small congregation that thinks it's a big congregation. That attitude is reflected in the large number of activities run by the Church relative to the size of our membership. It has also historically been reflected in the level of financial giving from members. You will read later on in this Report, however, that we spent more than we took in last year. This is a situation of some concern to the Finance & Stewardship Group and, of course, the Session. There are a number of reasons behind this shortfall. Our spending has increased and, in particular, we spent quite a

lot on maintenance last year (both necessary and prudent). Also, Newhaven Connections Café ran at a small loss.

Another significant reason behind the shortfall in our income against expenditure, however, is that members' donations were down in 2013 against 2012. In the current economic climate, of course, we are not surprised at this.

Stewardship Campaign

Nonetheless, the Session believes it is timely to undertake a Stewardship Campaign throughout the Congregation to encourage all those involved in the life of the Congregation to review prayerfully their commitments to Newhaven Church. As many of you will recall, when someone becomes a member of the Church of Scotland they undertake to give a fitting proportion of their time, talents and money to the service of God. As Jesus showed us so clearly with the example of the poor widow, those commitments should not be measured solely in financial terms. What counts at the end of the day is not what you give, but it's how you give. And so the success of our Stewardship Campaign will not be measured solely in financial terms, but first and foremost in the renewed spirit of commitment to God's work in Newhaven taken on by the Congregation.

The Stewardship Campaign will be launched later in the year. I urge all members and those involved in the life of the Congregation to take time to consider, carefully and prayerfully, what of their time, their talents and their money they can commit to the service of God through Newhaven Church.

Clarification of scope of Development Fund

As many in the Congregation will remember, a very significant sum of money was raised by pledges from the Congregation to help with the refurbishment of the Church premises almost ten years ago. Most of this fund, known as the Development Fund was used in the

refurbishment, but there was a sizeable sum left over which stands at approximately £62,000 today. Since the refurbishment the Development Fund has been used for certain items of capital expenditure on the premises (for example, the treatment of ceilings in the Main Hall ceiling and Café area in order to improve acoustics) but it has been felt that the original purpose of the Development Fund (being primarily to fund the refurbishment programme) has run its course, and that it would be very useful to clarify what the Development Fund may be used for in the future.

The Kirk Session proposes therefore that the Development Fund may be applied towards:

"any activity, project or item which the Kirk Session considers to be consistent with Newhaven Church's mission statement of "Serving Christ, each other and the community". Items considered to be usual running expenses of the Church premises would be specifically excluded."

This is a deliberately broad scope, one which would include such diverse items such as outreach activities, purchase of equipment, maintenance of the Church premises (eg major decoration), but would specifically not be able to be spent on usual running expenses (eg gas and electricity costs).

This proposal will be put to the Congregation at the Annual Stated Meeting on 31 March 2014 and, if approved by the Congregation, the change will be notified to the Office of the Scottish Charities Regulator for its formal approval.

Retirements from the Kirk Session

Throughout 2013 we saw a number of long serving Elders step down from the Kirk Session. Angus Macrae, after over 40 years as an Elder; Moyra Logan after 20 years as an Elder and Eileen Tait after 13 years as an Elder. We are grateful for the contributions to Newhaven Church made by each of them.

Finance and Stewardship

The Finance and Stewardship Group saw its long-standing convener, Moyra Logan, resign during 2013. Moyra has been a faithful member of Newhaven's Finance and Stewardship (F&S) Group for more years than I'm sure she would wish me to mention, and has steered this particular ship through many changes, for which we would like to convey our sincere gratitude. It goes without saying that we will miss her, but we wish Moyra well in retirement from our church finances.

The church finances are explained in more detail within the annual accounts which are appended to this report, so I don't propose to elaborate further on the actual figures here, but merely highlight key facts and provide an overview of what we have been up to and indeed our plans for the coming year.

2013 has been a tough year for Newhaven Church's finances - we have spent more than we took in. This is the result of several factors, including:- reduced donations in 2013, increased maintenance cost (both gas and electricity have seen huge price increases) and the size of the Ministries and Mission contribution that we are required to make to the Church of Scotland (which covers its central running costs as well as our minister's stipend).

The F&S Group has met regularly, and in doing so have made progress in many areas. The key areas we focussed on during 2013 were Gift Aid, Free Will Offering (FWO), database input (record keeping), bank and investment issues, and Stewardship.

We would like to take this opportunity to thank all members of the congregation who, being UK taxpayers, signed a new Gift Aid mandate (should you wish a Gift Aid declaration please speak to a member of the group). In the last quarter of 2013 we were able to submit claims backdated to 2011 and 2012 for a tax rebate on all donations received, and at the time of writing this

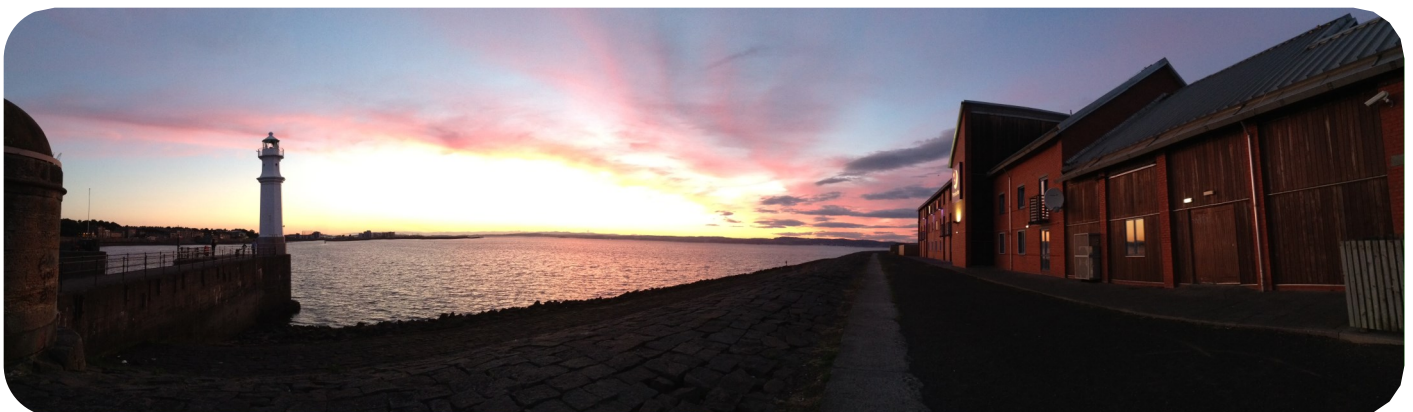
report we are processing a claim for 2013. Gift Aid rebates make a huge difference to our balance sheet and we have put in place a new system to allow us to keep on top of the work required by the F&S Group. This has resulted in some members of the congregation receiving a new FWO envelope number for 2014, and also a change to the Sunday banking teams' input sheet. A big thank you to all who are involved in this very important task every Sunday - your help is invaluable and makes our task a little bit easier.

As is the case with many spheres of life in this day and age, finding someone to talk to at a bank is never easy. Newhaven Church has banked for many years with the Royal Bank of Scotland, and we have several bank accounts. This is something we are looking to review (though may not necessarily change). You will see from the annual accounts the rate of interest is very poor, and to address this, we have now a point of contact at the bank, and will hopefully report back with progress during 2014.

Finally, our plans for 2014 include undertaking a review of expenditure as well as planning a Stewardship Campaign for later in the year to encourage members to review what they commit to the Church, across the three areas of **Time, Talent and Money**.

Fabric Report

Fabric 2013 was quite an exciting year with many tasks ranging from the on-going routine to the potentially dangerous!

Church:

In the early part of the year we had the Central Heating Boiler serviced and timings reset. The timings were reset again to reflect the change to British Summer Time and again as a result of a power failure. Later we had the heating re-set and a new programmer fitted.

Portable Appliance Testing resulted in two failures:-

- one was the cable for the floor polisher/scrubber and this was replaced.
- the second was a Microwave Oven in the Kitchen. The Kitchen staff were instructed to replace this unit and dispose of the defective unit.

New floor tiles were fitted at the back door.

The alarm system was reset on two occasions in addition to the power failure reset.

Library trolley required to have bolts tightened. (Note: This trolley is grossly overloaded and this was reported to Session via the Minister and Jeanette Meek).

Broken blind cord attended to.

A request was received from City of Edinburgh Council regarding a disabled persons parking notice to be fixed to our property. We agreed.

Met with Minister and Fabric Governance Group to determine if any items of significance require attention in the Church during the recess in 2013. None were identified.

In the second half of the year the following items were addressed:-

New cleaners sink and storage cupboard provided. Sink is now more compliant with health and safety needs.

Exterior decking: Power washed and treated with anti algae solution.

Church hot water pressurisation system serviced.

Hall floor rising in location at Fire Exit re-fixed.

Cupboard hooks for microphones provided at Praise Band area.

Lock replaced on door to large store.

Running cistern in Ladies repaired.

Codelock to chair store replaced.

Leaking toilet in Gents repaired.

Repair to Kitchen cooker (oven).

Two repairs to Kitchen dishwasher.

Kitchen cupboard door re-fitted.

Lock to back door replaced.

Broken toilet in Ladies repaired.

Smashed kitchen unit door replaced.

Door handles to main hall tightened.

Provided an electrical supply and timer to the Wayside Pulpit for Christmas lights to the main gate. The lights were fitted, removed, repackaged and stored for a future year.

A broken mirror in the Ladies has been replaced as well all mirrors in the Ladies and Gents having been refitted using bolts rather than glue. Also the supporting structure has been strengthened. Hopefully we have averted a potentially dangerous situation.

At the time of writing I am pleased to report that all of the lights both regular and emergency after much attention and replacement seem to be working.



Manse:

Met with the Minister to complete Manse Condition Schedule as part of annual property schedule. As a result of this the following works were carried out::

- Gateway to parking area widened and gate adjusted to suit.
- Six double glazing units replaced.
- External decoration of conservatory.
- Broken tiles on patio replaced.
- Plumbing work in attic to route overflow pipe to outside world, fix and insulate loose pipework and stop leaking cistern.

In closing I would like to thank the Minister, the Session, the Church Caretaker and the Fabric Work Group for all their support during this last year.

When the Church first established the system of Working Groups in 2009, the Appointments & Welfare Group was set up to make sure that the Groups were properly staffed, motivated and supported in their tasks. In addition, the Group organises a get together of all members of Working Groups. This took place in October 2013, and followed the previous pattern of a spokesperson from each Group giving an informal report on the experiences, frustrations, hopes and dreams of the Group.

Communications Group

During 2013 we were sad to say goodbye to Shona Adam as Chair of the Communications Group. We'd like to thank Shona, who has done a great job in taking the Church's communications forward, for chairing the group (we weren't always easy to Chair!), and for her ongoing support in pulling together the weekly Church intimations. The group's membership now stands at [Susan Edwards](#), [Elaine Greig](#), [Chris Myers](#) and a member of Mission and Outreach Group (temporarily [John Hodge](#), but the permanent member is to be confirmed).

As communication threads through the work of the Church, in October 2013 at the Working Group Get Together we asked the other groups how we could work with them to better support Newhaven Church in meeting its aims of 'serving Christ, each other and the community.' Following that meeting, it was clear that the other Working Groups had varying communication needs, but that there was much that could be done to support the work of the Mission and Outreach Group. As a result, we have invited a member of the Mission and Outreach Group to join the Communications Group, and will invite a 'rotating' guest member from each of the other groups to join each of our future meetings.

We now hold our meetings a couple of months prior to Easter, Harvest, Remembrance Sunday and Christmas in order to ensure that we are better able to support the Church to communicate to the

congregation and the wider community about these important festivals, and other Church events. In our meetings we also plan and evaluate other regular Church communications: including *Harbour Lights*, the Annual Report, the Intimations, Welcome Packs and the Website.

As everyone in our congregation communicates, we would like to thank all of those who have supported the communication of our Church over the year; whether it be posting one of the 2000 flyers that we distributed to the community at Christmas, pulling together *Harbour Lights*, the intimations, or welcome pack information (thanks particularly in this area to Elaine Greig, Shona Adam and Susan Edwards); through activities organised by other working groups such as Carol Singing (well done for getting others to join in!); through volunteering in any way for the Church; or even through your informal conversations with others about Church whether they be in our congregation or the wider community. Personal communication is really key, as it gives others a good sense of what's going on, and an insight into the culture of our Church.

If there is anything that you would like to communicate, or are surprised that hasn't been communicated to the congregation or the wider community, please let us know (bearing in mind that we can only communicate what has been communicated to us!). Children's Ministry

Each year the children's groups are always at the top of our agenda and this year has been no exception. As you read on you will see there has been a few changes in our Sunday school staff.

After 14 years, Shona Adam decided to stand down from her role of teaching Sunday school and Lynn MacNeill stepped back from teaching Lighthouse.

Brian Souness transferred from N-Lighten to Lighten Up, Louisa Mackenzie transferred from Lighten Up to N-Lighten and Richard Whyte joined Louisa in N-Lighten. Vivienne Whyte and Lynsey Orbegozo joined in assisting to teach the Lighthouse children and Irene Sutherland joined the Little Lights team. Thankfully this has now resolved some of our staffing issues.

The annual children's group questionnaires were submitted with two points of concern arising - **(a) The lack of children attending N-Lighten (P5-P7) and Lighten Up (S1 – S4) especially the latter; (b) Lack of support and professional guidance for leaders.**

Unfortunately at present the Education Group have no answers as to how to encourage our youth to attend church. However, the one thing we can all do is pray! Pray for our children and their individual group leaders, pray that as a church we can find ways in which to engage with the children and encourage them at whatever stage they may be at on their journey.

To help solve the issue of lack of support Lynn MacNeill has taken on the role of support person. The aim of this position is that Lynn will visit the individual groups on a routine basis providing support to the group leaders so that any concerns they may have be addressed more speedily.

Adult Education

We continue to have four growth groups who meet fortnightly to study God's word. In June, we held a meeting of all the groups which proved to be very successful - everyone commented on how they had benefited from this time together. You will read about these groups in more detail in the Growth Group Report.

Summer Lighthouse

Summer Sunday school ran from Sunday 7th July to Sunday 8th September. Again, it is with thanks to Kate Aitchison and her team of helpers that Summer Lighthouse ran so smoothly, allowing the regular leaders to have a much earned break. Little Lights ran as usual.

Pastoral Care Group

However we should not be complacent and the members of the congregation, the Session and the Pastoral Care Group must remain alert to the need to communicate regarding those in need of pastoral care. Missed communications can cause stress and concern for those involved.

Throughout the year we have arranged for the

distribution of the flowers from the Sunday service and we are very grateful to all those who provide the flowers each week and also those who distribute them to the members of the congregation.

The distribution of gifts at Christmas took place again this year and met with appreciation from the recipients. We would take this opportunity to thank all those who assisted with the purchase wrapping and distribution of the gifts.

Mission and Outreach Group (MOG)

To enable the people of God to be the people of God.

We are all full time Christian Workers – or at least we should be! We are followers of Jesus at work, at home, on the road, in the shops, as well as for an hour on Sundays. Outreach and witness is a full time occupation. We may be the only evidence that folk see of Jesus and we need to be aware of the privilege of being called to be ambassadors and the responsibility it brings.

There is also a place for employed workers and we are still exploring the possibility of appointing a Youth Worker. We had hoped for a better response to our advertisement but perhaps the time was not right. Another possibility of a joint appointment with Scripture Union Es-Team has opened up and we are currently exploring it.

The Mission Group tries to help us in our witness by laying on various events:-

Good Friday Prayer vigil was held again last year on a reduced scale. We did have prayer requests from the community and we continue to make this ministry known through the Trinity Spotlight and the church website. Prayer requests are left from time to time in the box at the entrance and are prayed for at the Wednesday Prayer Meeting.

We had thought about holding an **Alpha** course again but there was little take up. Alpha works best when friends and neighbours are brought along by members of the congregation. It is a great tool for evangelism but it needs prayer and commitment from us all to be effective. If there were a group who would commit to pray and seek God's guidance on inviting others we would be happy to plan one.

Inflatables. This fun day which was held in March will be repeated this year. This is an opportunity for church and non church groups to mix and have fun together. It has



been very useful in building links with Victoria School and some of the children also came to the Christmas Extravaganza.

Christmas Extravaganza. Once again many responded to the call and in the last Saturday before Christmas gave up a Saturday morning to host a fast moving fun event with a clear Christmas message for about 70 children both from the church and non-church families. This is a chance to present the Christmas story in a lively way. One needs to remember that there are more children nowadays who do not know the Christmas story. Thanks to all who made it such a success.

Carol singing. Carol singing took place at ASDA and the Starbank and by all accounts was a great success. The



collection of food at ASDA was for the food bank organised by the Trussel Trust through the local churches. Our carol singers seem to be greatly appreciated by the regulars at the Starbank. A very warm welcome was given and all present were fully involved in the singing. We had also hoped to have a carol party in one of the blocks of new flats but that did not prove possible.

Banner. After the Christmas banner last year we also purchased an Easter one. We will perhaps get a Pentecost one for this year. Displaying above the gate helps to indicate to those passing that the church is in business. The Communications Group took over the distribution of the Christmas leaflets this year and organised them most efficiently.

Worship Group

The Worship Group met twice in 2013 and comprises Peter Bluett, Christine Hodge, Chas Livingstone, Colin MacNeill and Jennifer Robertson. The task for the Group is to provide a programme of worship activities which, first and foremost, glorify God, but which also reflect the make up of our Congregation.

Throughout the year we used the theme of "the upside down nature of the Kingdom of God" to shape our All Age Services on the first Sunday of each month. The idea of this was to challenge our readiness to assume a world-shaped view of things, using the world's viewpoint and the world's logic, rather than what God tells us is important for the Kingdom of God, which so often ends up being the opposite of the world view. This started off with us looking at Jesus' parable of the workers in the vineyard, containing the conclusion that "the last shall be first and the first shall be last". We looked at the poor widow's offering and how God doesn't look at what you give, but how you give. Along the way we used Jesus' invitation to "let the little children come to me" to help us focus on the children of Kampi Child Care Centre in Kenya, which Newhaven Church is committed to supporting. As well as taking an offering for the Child Care Centre, the children of the Congregation drew pictures which we then sent to Kampi.

We are grateful to the many folk who've taken part in all of our services of worship, the All Age services, the Remembrance Sunday service, the Christmas services, as well as the usual weekly services. Lots of things have to be done in order that the services happen in the way they do and it's a source of much thanksgiving by the Worship Group that there are so many people involved, and who show so much grace and love in working together in as disparate tasks as welcoming visitors, taking part in a drama, serving tea and coffee afterwards (for which there is no duty rota but never fails to happen!), to putting the chairs away, arranging and then delivering flowers (as well as all the other tasks not mentioned).

A regular comment made by visitors to our Sunday morning services is the friendly and welcoming atmosphere they experience. This is not down just to those involved in the service (far less what goes on at Worship Group meetings), but down to the friendly and welcoming nature of people in the Congregation and their eagerness to share the fellowship of the Holy Spirit with newcomers. We give thanks to God for such a Congregation!

At our AGM we thanked Mary Craig for her meticulous care as Guild Roll Keeper for countless years and accepted her resignation from this post whilst looking forward to seeing her have a more relaxing time now at our meetings. Happily this important duty has been taken over by Pauline Ross as we are aware that Newhaven Guild is a thriving Guild in the city and has a healthy "Roll" to keep.

Our Bible Study afternoon with Peter in April was thought provoking and encouraged our involvement in proclaiming our faith in our everyday lives. A successful fundraising effort with our "coin tubes" meant that a grand total of £520 was forwarded to Guild Office to add to the National Guild Donations to the Julius Project which befriends and helps Scottish homeless people. We thank everyone who contributed to this appeal.

A party of us visited Loretto School in the springtime to view the Prestonpans Tapestry. We were warmly welcomed by the staff of Loretto and the curator of the Tapestry and were truly amazed at the detail of the stitching which made up such a wonderful art work of our history.

Our annual bus trip in May took us back to a favourite spot, the Scottish Arts and Antiques Centre at Abernethy where we met up once again with our friends from our Link Guild from Arbroath and Inverkeilor. There we enjoyed lunching together and later browsed the quirky antique items of housewares, jewellery and retro-style clothes. Well worth a visit time and time again.

After our summer break we resumed in September to take up the new Guild Theme, "A Fellowship to Build", and to decide on our next Guild Project. We decided to fundraise for 2 of the latest projects this session...*Comfort Rwanda* and *Self Reliant Groups* for women in deprived areas of Scotland.

In October we welcomed Andrew Downie, a Guide on the Edinburgh Open Top Buses, who entertained us with anecdotes of the many interesting and often strange characters who have travelled on these city tours. The Edinburgh theme was continued with a visit from cine film enthusiast, Ian Rintoul, with footage of Portobello hay days.

In November we learned more about our Rwanda Project from Kilvert and Margaret Croft who have spent much time in that country. They explained how, in partnership with The National Guild, a village of 100 homes will be built in Rwanda for the survivors of the horrendous 1994 genocide through the Ministry of Peace and Reconciliation there. We also enjoyed a visit from two Street Pastors who are part of the volunteer Christians who go out into our city streets in the small hours each weekend when most of us are warm and safe at home. It is reassuring to hear how many of our young people who might find themselves alone in vulnerable situations are cared for both physically and spiritually by these night time pastors.

The festive season started with a lovely afternoon of music and song from our friends Kate, Yvonne, Irene and Alastair. Everyone really enjoys this visit and hopes it becomes a regular event in our Guild calendar. We had our Christmas Lunch "at home" in our own church halls, our caterers providing a delicious menu, and an exciting game of "pass the 5 Parcels" brought our last meeting of the year to a happy conclusion.

We look forward to another interesting and enjoyable Guild Year in 2014 with friends old and new. Why not drop in and join us? You will be made very welcome.

The Boys' Brigade

This year has consolidated last year's rebuilding in the 20th Leith.

We now have a healthy number of boys each Friday (8-10) between P7 and S2, and the Company section should again be secure for the long-term. The annual best uniform/attendance competition is hotly contested so the boys are always smartly turned out! Otherwise we provide a mix of classes, games, trips and Christian teaching, with Peter attending most weeks to engage the boys in high-brow theological discussions! We took the boys away to an outdoor centre in the Borders shortly before the new session started in September, which really helped build a team spirit in the section. We have also taken them to go-karting, ten-pin bowling and indoor and outdoor laser tag, as well as a tour of HMS Edinburgh and the Scotland v South Africa game at Murrayfield with the older Junior section members.



Numbers remain strong in the Junior section, at 18 boys. We continue to offer a mix of games, crafts and teaching to boys from P4-P6, this year covering topics such as geography, the outdoors, nationality and racism, as well as taking them on trips to places such as Roslin Glen and go-karting. A weekend away to Lendrick Muir is planned for February, including members of the Company section.

The Anchorboys provide a mix of games and teaching for boys in P1-P3, including movie-making, cooking, crafts, and parties for Halloween and Christmas. A large cohort of boys moved up to the Juniors at the end of session 2012-13 so we are now keen to get new boys in at Anchorboy age. Please do recommend us to any friends or family you think might be interested (and not just at Anchorboy age!).

The numbers in the Junior section prompted a staff reshuffle in September, with Brian Souness moving from

the Company staff to join Andrew Gillies and Allan Gilbert in the Junior section. I was delighted to welcome Robert Inglis back to the staff after a couple of years off. Bob is now helping with the Juniors after several years' experience in the Company section.

I was also very pleased that Chris Myers joined the Anchorboy staff for this session, as has Bob's younger brother Scott Inglis. They have joined Lesley-Anne and Robert Weir on the staff, and their addition has made up for the loss of Jamie Quinn, who is currently travelling around Australia!



Our coffee morning in May 2013 was a tremendous success, raising over £1,000, which we think may be a record. Combining that with a £1,500 grant we received from BB headquarters last year, which allowed us to purchase new equipment and fund a number of trips, means the company is now in good financial health as well as having healthy numbers.

On a more downbeat note, we were deeply shocked and saddened in 2013 by the death of former 20th member Callum Murray, aged just 22. 'Caz' was a huge part of the 20th for over 12 years, starting in the Anchorboys and staying with the 20th until he finished at 18. The turnout of current and former BB staff and boys at his (standing-room only) funeral was a real tribute to the affection in which he was held by all who knew him. Please do say a quick prayer for his family and friends.

In memory of Callum, we will be instituting a special long-service award – the Callum Murray Memorial award – for boys who join at the start of Anchorboys and remain with the Company right through. Some of the boys currently in the Company section are eligible for that, so if they remain with us the award should see its first recipients in 2018.

As always the success of the 20th is chiefly down to the staff who put so much effort in (including my fellow Company section leaders Keith Robertson and Michael Galinsky), as well as the parents and church members who support us. Please give thanks for them in your prayers.
