A Word from the Minister

Dear Friends

A few weeks after Christmas I was told by someone that they really felt a sense of being a family this Christmas, in terms of being the Body of Christ at Newhaven. I was glad to hear the comment and could reply that I felt the same way. The services were great to be a part of and they were great to be a part of for two reasons: they

sought to glorify God people were enthusiastic to be a part of what was happening. In a sense it didn't matter if everything went according to plan because the taking part and being together with a common purpose is what mattered. I never fail to give thanks for the enthusiasm people show for wanting to get involved in all that happens in the church and because of the

participation and the enthusiasm shown we are able to witness the love of Christ and the bonds that tie us together in relationship grow stronger as we learn to live with each other, as we learn to relate.

In I Corinthians 12 from verse 12 the apostle Paul tells the people at Corinth that they are one body but they have many members, that each part of that body is different and performs a different function or task. His lesson to them is a lesson to us. We are not the same. We don't all think alike, we don't look alike, we all have different abilities, and have different worldviews, but the wonder in it all is that we all have a place, and what unites us, apart from the obvious fact that we are all human beings, is Christ. Jesus blesses us with a love that is able to touch each and

every one of us and he blesses us with a common purpose, to love God and to love one another, and it's in this that we are able to exist, it's in this that we are able to live and move and have our being, and more and more as I witness us as a congregation these things are evident. I have lost count of the number of times people/strangers have made remarks about the warmth they feel in this

place and that warmth is only generated by us, God`s people. Importantly, such warmth and love a n d acceptance doesn't just fall out of the sky, it often takes much discipline and hard work because we as human beings are inclined to think of Self but I

want to encourage you to always seek to be the light of Christ to others, to be gracious in your dealings with each other and with people who visit our church, whether they are there for a meeting or simply to enjoy the cafe. These are simple things but they matter. They are the building blocks of good relationships.

Gordon MacDonald once said, "The world can do almost anything as well as or better than the church. You need not be a Christian to build houses, feed the hungry, or heal the sick. There is only one thing the world cannot do. It cannot offer grace." Yancey, P; p15; 1997.

I believe MacDonald is right. We have been given great treasures, we have been touched by amazing grace, and we live in a world that is greatly lacking in grace for all sorts of



reasons, and we are able to inject grace back into society in the way we live and in the way we love, and it might well begin at home but the place where we learn as followers of the Way is at church and being church. Friends, never underestimate the importance of these seemingly simple things. Paul reminds that only three things remain - faith, hope and love - and that love trumps everything. So continue to love one another through thick and through thin. All the activities, all the groups that meet in the name of Newhaven Church must be built on this foundation not only because it is right and good but also because people flourish and bloom when they are nurtured by love, when we truly let the fruits of God's Spirit penetrate our emotions and let them mould us and shape us.

I want to say thank you, not only as the minister of this church, but as a brother in Christ and a fellow Christian, to all the people who give so much of their time and energy to serve God in this place. Were I to compile a list my report would be very, very long. Thank you for your participation, thank you for your enthusiasm, thank you for your desire to want to build good things in this place. Thank you that even when you are overstretched and tired you still go the extra mile. Your love and your care does not go unnoticed. Indeed thank you to the congregation who week after week make worship a blessing and a good place to be.

I am looking forward to the rest of the year. If you read the Session Clerk's report you will notice that there are a number of ideas etc, in the pipeline. Please support these endeavours and remember them in your prayers, and don't forget to seek to be a part of one of the many areas of ministry in our church.

Let me finish with a quote:

"Let love be genuine; hate what is evil, hold fast to what is good; love one another with mutual affection; outdo one another in showing honour. Do not lag in zeal, be ardent in spirit, serve the Lord. Rejoice in hope, be patient in suffering, persevere in prayer. Contribute to the needs of the saints; extend hospitality to strangers. Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse them. Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep. Live in harmony with one another; do not be haughty, but associate with the lowly; do not claim to be wiser than you are. Do not repay anyone evil for evil, but take thought for what is noble in the sight of all. If it is possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all." Romans 12:14-18.

Session Report

When we travel with our heads down, we become engrossed in the short yards ahead, rather than the long miles to the horizon. Keeping your eyes focussed on what's immediately ahead or immediately behind is good for avoiding obstacles but it means that we can fail to appreciate the distance we've travelled, or the general direction of our journey, or indeed its wider purpose.

Every so often, therefore, it's a good thing to stop, take stock of where we are, and gaze out towards our horizons. So for the Kirk Session of Newhaven Church 2012 was a time when, in and amongst the usual activities of our Church that you read of elsewhere in this Annual Report, we took time together to reflect upon where God has led Newhaven Church in the last few years; and where we think He's leading us for the next few years.

To do this we held two conferences, one in January and one in October. The January conference saw us travel to Pitlochry for an overnight stay in the Atholl Centre which is a Christian run residential centre. It was a very valuable time of fellowship, prayer and discussion with Peter Bluett leading the teaching by having us consider on the one hand the vision of the Old Testament prophets, and then on the other hand the vision of Jesus. It allowed the Elders, conscious of their roles as leaders in this Church, some time to rest in the presence of God, rather than rushing headlong off without Him.

In October we spent a Saturday at Duddingston Kirk when we followed a more directed programme that challenged us to look at a number of topics. These included how the ideas of "community" have changed over recent decades, how the role of the church within the community has changed, specifically what has Newhaven Church's role been in its community, what are its strengths and weaknesses? what should we be setting as our goals for the future (our **Vision**) and how do we think we might achieve them (our **Strategy**)?

Both conferences were characterised with an awareness of God's grace, His revelation to us, encouragement to each other, much laughter and a general sense of togetherness.

Since the October conference we have tried to draw out the observations that we made. We have gone on to form a Vision and Strategy in more detail and it is these observations, Vision and Strategy which we present to the Congregation here.

Observations

Some broad observations were made, and which influenced our conclusions about what Newhaven's role should be in our community.

§ Different and changing communities – in previous generations people took their sense of community from the area in which they lived, and the parish church was defined by, and directed to, the geographic parish, and those who lived within it.

For many people now, however, the importance of the geographic community of where they live and those who live around them is much less than the sense of community they get from the other circles in which they find themselves. Communities that centre upon the workplace, or shared interests (eg following a particular team, or hobby) or even the pub are no less able to give a sense of togetherness and mutual support than the traditional "local community". As the sense of "community" diminishes in our neighbourhoods, we recognised that areas of strong community feeling do exist in these other communities. If the church is to be the manifestation of Christ in the community (salt and light), then the church should recognise where "community" exists nowadays and get itself into such "communities".

- Newhaven Church has many strengths a sense of togetherness; our Cafe; the preaching and centrality of the Word; unity of the Session; our style of music and worship; our Guild; our outreach through Haven, Toddlers, BBs; Growth Groups; children's groups, and many others. There are of course weaknesses, but as we considered these points and the journey of Newhaven Church in recent years and even decades, we saw how God has been right at the heart of the story of Newhaven Church through that time. We acknowledged that, even when it didn't seem so at the time, God's hand was at work: sometimes what we considered our strengths were taken away and what we considered setbacks became blessings.
- The challenge of volunteers we are frustrated with the shortage of volunteers for key mission activities such as the Cafe and Toddlers. As we considered these midweek daytime activities we concluded that our congregation is not lacking people who are willing to get involved, but for these key activities many people simply can't get involved because of daytime commitments such as work and family care. This can be summarised as: of those who are available in our congregation not enough are able, and of those who are able not enough are available. Acknowledging this brings with it a realisation that, possibly, we should consider outreach activities that can harness the willingness, availability and ability of those in our congregation. This pointed us back to the "communities" we all find ourselves in, and expands our mission horizon. It also gave strength to the conviction that now is the right time to consider employing a Youth Worker to help with the provision of mid-week activities for our young people.
- § Mission Statement Serving Christ, each other and the community as a short and focussed phrase, we considered that our current "mission statement" continued to encapsulate all that we are called to be.

Vision

We see our Vision as two fold.

- § To enable the people of God to be the people of God teaching, nurturing and encouraging those in the Congregation, both as individuals and as a group
- § To be the manifestation of Christ in our community a new Newhaven Lighthouse the Congregation (whether in their individual lives or in Church activities) being salt and light in the world.

Both elements are important and are, of course, intertwined. We cannot expect to be salt and light outside in our communities if we are not being taught, nurtured, nourished, challenged, encouraged and supported from within the church.

Strategy

§ To enable the people of God to be the people of God

- In the teaching from the pulpit to expose the depths of the Bible and to encourage the Congregation to engage with it in such depth, that in doing so they may more closely engage in their relationship with God, through the love of Jesus Christ.
- Continue to support and encourage Growth Groups and encourage more people to join such groups (including Wednesday evening Bible study) or form new groups
- Encourage individual and corporate prayer

§ To be the manifestation of Christ in our communities

- Continue to support existing outreach activies (Cafe, Haven, Toddlers, BBs)

New outreach activities:

- Primary school children harness and build upon Holiday Clubs, Light Party, Christmas Extravaganza
- Teens to ensure that our current and future generations of teenagers continue on their journey with God. Combined Lighten up/Footprints activities, link up with other churches.
- Youth worker the Kirk Session feels very strongly that the time is right for Newhaven Church to seek to appoint a Youth Worker to help with our outreach strategy for children and teenagers.
- Working men and women recognising that we actually have quite a number of folk in their 30s, 40s and 50s who are in full time work or family care and for whom a midweek evening meet-up in a social environment might be a good setting for fellowship and nurturing. This needn't be every week, say once a month, and ideally would meet in a local pub or restaurant.
- Inbetweeners recognising that we have a number of folk who have retired but still very active and for whom a midweek afternoon of activity (eg table tennis) might be a good setting for fellowship and nurturing.

Newhaven Connections Café

The Café started life as a vision over ten years ago. Six years ago it became a reality and since then has become a very important part of the life of Newhaven Church and its service to our community. At the time of developing the vision for the Café it was seen as an important feature

that it should essentially be self funding, through a combination of its own takings and grants from outside bodies. For the first few years we had outside grants which helped to cover the cost of salaries. Those outside grants have not continued and in the last couple of years it has become apparent that takings are not sufficient to cover the costs of supplies and salaries. The Café Committee that oversees the running of the Café is taking steps to minimise any shortfall (such as increasing prices) and the contribution of the volunteers who help to staff the Café is hugely appreciated in helping it to continue as a service to our community.

There are two things, however, that we want to bring fully to the attention of the Congregation. First, the need for volunteers continues to be acute and any help that can be offered, whether from members of our Congregation or outside it, will be considered seriously and gratefully. Second, we would like the Congregation to appreciate that those who support the work of Newhaven Church financially are indirectly supporting the very important work of Newhaven Connections Café.

Youth Worker

As our Strategy mentions, the Kirk Session is making plans for the employment of a Youth Worker. It is hoped that such a Youth Worker could be in place by the Autumn of 2013. It is likely that such a position would be part-time, and we would seek to obtain outside funding to help pay the salary. However, there will be an inevitable financial cost to the Congregation and we are exploring specific ways in which the Congregation can provide its support in a way that shows our individual and corporate commitment to spreading the Gospel amongst our young people. This proposal will take Newhaven Church's journey into new lands and as such can be compared to the steps taken those years ago to set up the Café. As the Kirk Session, we believe that this is a vitally important journey for us to take, and we urge the Congregation to support it.

Annual Stated Meeting

As you can see, these plans ask a lot of the Congregation and its faith. If they are to be anything more than words on a page, our Vision and Strategy need the support of the Congregation. Therefore, there will be the opportunity to discuss the Vision and Strategy at this year's Annual Stated Meeting, to be held on Monday 18 March 2013. We hope that this will be an opportunity for the whole Congregation to look back, not just over a period of 12 months, to reflect upon distance and direction travelled and to look forward to a shared vision for serving God together in the future.

Unless the Lord builds the house...

More important than our own approval, we recognise the truth that "unless the Lord builds the house, the builders labour in vain" (*Psalm 127:1*). We can see that, in spite of our failings, weaknesses and pride, God has indeed built the congregation of Newhaven Church. And if we look even further back, we see the cross and the empty tomb, and are reminded that it is Jesus, not us, who is alive and at work in our lives and in our communities. As we look to the future, we can be assured that He will continue with that work, as long as we fix our eyes upon Him, the author and perfecter of our faith.

Mission and Outreach Group (MOG)

To enable the people of God to be the people of God.

We are called to be the body of Christ. That is a really challenging thought. Jesus has commissioned us to be his presence on this earth and that involves each of us in our communities. It is not just for those who like that sort of thing but for all who claim to be Christians.

Let us look and see what we have done.

The group have laid on various events. These are opportunities but not the only ones. There are many folk being effective lights in their communities in different ways. If that is what God has called you to do, that is what is right for you.

Good Friday Prayer vigil was held again last year and appreciated by those who took part and also members of the community who submitted prayer requests. Perhaps

the time has come for a change here. We still think that the prayer ministry is something which the church is uniquely qualified to offer. We need to see how to make it more available.

An **Alpha** course was run in the church from September to December. We were encouraged that there were those for whom it made a real difference and are keen to deepen their understanding the faith. There is a danger that it can be seen as a project of a few individuals. We need to get a nucleus of people to pray, invite guests to the course and partake. Alpha has been used world wide as a means of many coming to know Jesus. Please pray as to whether

God wants to use you to invite someone to come (i.e. come with me – not just to go) to a course.

Inflatables. This fun day which was held in March will be repeated this year. This is an opportunity for church and non church groups to mix and have fun together. It is useful for building up relations with others. One also meets the parents and links made have led to the same children coming to the Christmas Extravaganza.


Christmas Extravaganza. Once again many responded to the call and in the last Saturday before Christmas gave up a Saturday morning to host a fast moving fun event with a clear Christmas message for about 80 children both from the church and non church families.



Lighthouse

Those who attend Lighthouse are aged from Primary I-4 and we have I2 children on our register. We started the year learning from Luke's Gospel, travelling through Luke Street, a Scripture Union resource with a short dvd introduction that the children really enjoyed. Each week we followed Jesus into different houses where he went to teach and heal.

This took us all the way up to the Summer break. Lighthouse continued throughout July and August, staffed by Kate Aitchison and Christine Hodge, supported by a reserve list of helpers.

The final half of the year has been spent exploring the Parables (some familiar and some less well known to the children) and being detectives trying to uncover the important messages that Jesus wants to share with us.

As ever, this has been done through bible stories, crafts, games and prayer. Each week we had hand painted pictures from Moyra Logan which were put up on display in the Lighthouse room to help remind the children of the stories.

We are heading into the New Year with an exciting programme where we are going to be thinking with the children about the Beatitudes (or Bee attitudes in case you wonder why our message board has so many stripy insects on it). We are using an age appropriate resource called 'The Big Book of Questions & Answers' to assist us in keeping this important teaching pitched at the right level.

Thankfully she hasn't given up entirely and due to lack of one person taking over we now have a 4 teams of 2-3 people every week running the group, with one of us in charge of administration. The group has run well like this although it would be good if each team consisted of 3 members (only 2 do). We could also do with a reserve list for help on occasion.

Toddlers are an extremely popular group with an excellent reputation locally for being very friendly, having a lovely large, clean, bright hall with great toys that are clean and well maintained.

Parents and carers now help to tidy up each week and quite a few use the café to meet together or meet with friends for lunch after the group. It's great to see mutual support in action.

A typical day will have free play, sometimes a craft and then snack for both parents and children, ending with a massive tidy-up and into the little lights hall for singing.

2012 opened with the return of a popular speaker to the Guild, Mr Charles Hutton MBE, who guided us with humour and pictures through a history of Edinburgh Castle. He uncovered many less well- known secrets of intrigue and dastardly deeds within its ancient walls.

Charlie is a hard act to follow but our next guest speaker from Hearts and Minds was as different as to be every bit as interesting. "Clowndoctors" had been heard of by many Guild members, but everyone was surprised at just

how misguided our ideas were! We learned that they are not "dressed up real doctors" but rather professional performers, many of whom are familiar faces on TV. Clowndoctors use many techniques including improvisation, music, puppetry and storytelling to try to normalise healthcare environments. They see beyond the illness and make connection with the individual child. It is the only organisation delivering work of this kind in Scotland and is also now taking this particular therapy to the elderly in hospitals and care homes under the name of Elderflowers (www.heartsandminds. org.uk)

Continuing with the "children" theme, our next visitor was Kieran Hudson, an ex Newhaven Church B.B. who was moved during volunteer work in Kenya to establish the Kipawa Trust. This is a small, local based charity which feeds and improves the welfare of 400 slum children who attend Mukuya School near Thika, 2 hours north of Nairobi (www.kipawa.org.uk)

Peter, our minister, joined with us in March for a Bible Study which expanded our understanding of the year's Guild theme during 2012 from Micah on walking humbly with our God. We look forward to Peter's visit each year and appreciated his particular insight into this oft quoted Bible verse and how it can impact our lives.

As the spring evenings lengthened, we took advantage of the longer light and enjoyed an "evening supper" under the shadow of the two bridges at South Queensferry. Following a day away in May for lunch in the Abbots' House in the grounds of Dunfermline Abbey we enjoyed our summer break until resuming in September when we broke with tradition and altered our fortnightly meeting time from Tuesday evenings to Monday afternoons (who ever said The Guild is stuck in its ways?) This has been widely welcomed by many of our members and will be reviewed at our next AGM.

In November, to celebrate the 125th Anniversary of The Church of Scotland Guild, we invited our neighbouring Guild from Wardie Church to a Musical Afternoon Tea when we were wonderfully entertained by Kate Aitchison (accordion) and friends Alastair (guitar), Irene and Yvonne (singers). Their mix of traditional and popular music and song kept spirits high and feet tapping on a November day.

Our afternoons drew to a close for the Christmas Holiday with a visit from Marilyn Keilloh from Stepping Stones North Edinburgh whose work with young mothers is giving advice and hope for brighter futures to many very young girls as they raise their children.

As you can see, our Guild continues to find out about what is going on in the world we live in and gets involved in doing what we can to make a difference while ensuring that friendship, caring for each other and praising God is never off our agenda.

We extend a warm invitation to new members. Why not come along to our meetings? You are assured a warm welcome and, of course, tea and cake!

The Haven

The Haven Centre continues to meet every Wednesday between 10 & 12 and although our numbers can be as low as 35 some weeks, other weeks we are nearer the 50 mark. There are now 9 gentlemen who regularly attend and 8 of them play dominoes, very competitively, each week. We still have occasional speakers but our ladies mostly chat as The Haven is ideal for them catching up with each other. The art group continues with 3 regular artists and a further 3 who visit as and when they can. We are able to show our art on the cafe walls and we actually sell some of our work which is a great encouragement.

At time of writing we are making plans for a party to celebrate having collected over £3,000 in our "water" bottle since this started in early 2006. In real terms this means that 40 families in various African countries now have clean water by way of BioSand Filters for life. We provided 61 mosquito nets in Kenya and 2 children, in China and India, have had cleft palette surgery. We have also sent to Disaster Response appeals. This past year we gave help to send the Shoe Boxes on their journey to Belarus, Bethany's Night Shelter, Mary's Meals Back Pack Project in Malawi and The Great Pentlands Push raising funds for St Columba's Hospice to name only a few. It is always amazing to record how much has been done from a small bottle and many people giving small change.

Sadly we have lost some of our friends this year - Chrissie, Charlie, Betsy & Jessie - but we have great memories of them to remind us of all the time they were with us.

The Friday Fancy Footwork partnership between The Haven and North East Edinburgh Ageing Well continues to thrive. There is a new teacher but, as she had an accident, actually on her way to take the class, so far she has only taken I class this term but 2 volunteers have stepped in so that this very popular class can continue. One of their other activities is walking and those groups often finish their walks at our cafe and their photography group have had an exhibition in the cafe thus the partnership spreads beyond The Haven.

As always thanks are due to our faithful committee, Retta our Treasurer, Louisa, Elizabeth, Mary and Heather and without our dedicated volunteers, Pauline, Mary, Jean, Marina, Margaret, Don, Evelyn and Vera, some of whom have served The Haven from the very beginning, there would be no Haven. Many thanks to you all. God has richly blessed the work of The Haven and we pray for His continued leading in all we do.


Thank you to everyone who played a part in our 2012 Operation Christmas Child campaign and look out for our next one!
