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A Word from the Minister

Dear Friends

A Reflection.

Firstly, thank you to all those who have not only written reports for the activities of our church in the last year, but have also been involved in them. I am grateful for the dedication people have to God and our community in this place, in so many different ways. It's a great blessing to witness. Thank you, too, to the members of our Session. It is great, firstly, to see the love and respect that the members of the Session have for one another and for the members of our congregation, but also to see the dedication and passion the members have for the things of God and God's kingdom. There's a palpable "buying in" from our Session, which is greatly encouraging. John Hodge, our Session Clerk, has once again done a wonderful job in serving us, in a number of different ways, as have so many people who give of their time and effort, their gifts and talents, for the sake of God's kingdom. Thank you, too, to those who enjoy fellowship at Newhaven and to all those who so kindly support its work. It gives me tremendous joy to lead you in worship each Sunday and to serve you as your minister.

Two things that have struck me over and over again in my time as a minister. Firstly, the importance of gratitude to God in our lives as followers of Jesus, through both the joyful times and the times when we might feel we are wandering in the wilderness, and, secondly, the importance of good relationships built on the foundation of love that God has given us to share.



I believe very firmly that good things only happen when our relationships are healthy, when we encourage the love of God in Jesus to be at the forefront of who we are and what we are about.

Paul tells us as much in 1 Corinthians 13, when he writes about what love looks like, and emphasises the point that without love, we can do nothing. Paul doesn't leave it there, however. He tells us that without love we are nothing. Something, I believe,

which is often overlooked when we let other things get in the way. Of course, it doesn't mean that we are always going to be of one mind, but just because we might not always be of one mind, it doesn't mean our love for each other should be diminished or threatened.

Having said this, I believe we are a loving and caring part of Christ's body, and my prayer is always that we will continue to grow in his love day by day and week by week.

Often, it seems, people believe that good things come about when grandiose schemes and plans are drawn up to achieve certain goals, but I don't believe this is necessarily true. I believe the love of Jesus is expressed and experienced in the small things that happen between people - in simple acts of kindness or a word of encouragement to someone who simply needs to know they are loved. And all these small acts add up. All we need are eyes to see and ears to hear, to keep our hearts and minds and souls focused firmly on our Lord and the things he has taught us about how we might live.

Something I would like to mention, and something I have been a part of, is our Re-Belonging course that Colin MacNeill and I have been leading. It's always been an ambition of mine to be able to create a space where people can study the Bible together and ask the difficult questions that they might have concerning issues that we find in scripture. I wanted it to be something original, something that we had spent time writing. In a discussion with Colin about my thoughts, he said, "Why don't we do it!" And, so, we did. What we have produced is a twelve-week, fortnightly course covering the vast span of the Bible. For all involved, I believe, it has been nourishing, and both Colin and I have thoroughly enjoyed leading it and dealing with challenging questions that people have asked. We are considering what we do next, but I'm sure we will be running another course in the not too distant future and would encourage you to join us.

One of the issues we have sought to deal with is the question of "Where is God today?" It's a question, I believe, everyone asks at various times in their lives, especially in challenging times.

As one of Job's friends put it, "Man is born to trouble as surely as sparks fly upward." [Job 5:7].

The Psalmist asked God, "Why do you hide yourself in times of trouble?" [Psalm 10:1].

And though we might ask "why" the truth is that "why", more often than not, remains a mystery. As Christians we believe that we live in a fallen world, one in which things often go dreadfully wrong, and one in which bad choices might also lead to bad outcomes, but the fact is - in the Bible we rarely get an answer to the question "why?".

What people in the Bible did get, instead, was an encounter. They got an encounter with the living God who brought his strength and encouragement in the midst of their troubles so that they could walk through the darkest valleys and emerge on the other side. The calling on their lives was to put all their trust in God, to confess to God that they didn't necessarily understand what they were going through, and perhaps didn't like what they were going through, but through it all, they were going to put their trust in God, who would never leave them nor forsake them.

"The eternal God is your refuge," we read in the Book of Deuteronomy 33:27, "and underneath are the everlasting arms."

I believe, through thick and thin, as individuals, and as a congregation, that is what we are also called to do. To put our complete trust in God, as challenging as that might sometimes be, using the often mysterious gift of faith that God has blessed us with.

Much like the people of Israel wandering in the wilderness, we don't know exactly what lies ahead, but one thing we do know is that we can trust in God, for God's presence, for God's love, and for God's guidance. So let us put our trust in God and seek God's face as we journey together in this life.

Let us also give thanks to God that nothing can separate us from God's love, in Christ Jesus.

Report from the Kirk Session

This year was quite eventful. At the end of 2023 the Kirk Session had decided that it wanted to meet with the presbytery to consider the way forward in the discussions with North and South Leith churches. The union between North Leith and South Leith Churches went ahead and the united congregation is now making plans to call a minister. At the same time, we wanted to meet with representatives of the presbytery to discuss the situation. This meeting was held in April and we were given a very fair hearing by them. They initially met with Peter and then with the rest of the Session. During the year they have indicated that they would get back to us about the way forward but it might take some time as they had other more pressing issues to deal with. As a result, the Kirk Session were encouraged to spend time waiting upon God to discern what our calling was going forward. It was also decided to have various extra session meetings in the year when we did not deal with routine business but spent time to try and discern what God wanted from us. These times have been varied, times of sharing, times of silent prayer, times of reflecting on what we had learnt.

At the same time, the usual congregational business also needed to be attended to. There are separate reports on fabric and finance matters. The Scottish Government had introduced a new Register of Controlling Interests in Property and we had to register the Manse in this new register. We also review our risk register annually. We have also spent a lot of time trying to clarify and simplify the insurance arrangements with the factors of the flats in the old church building. We have struck up very cordial relations with the flat owners.

Arrangements were made for Peter's Sunday message to be available once again on the website and we are glad that his message can now have a wider circulation. In addition, we continue to deliver written copies of the Thought for the Week to those without internet connection.

We also receive a regular report from Brian Souness on events at the Presbytery. Safeguarding is also an item that is always on the agenda. New regulations mean that we have to remove people from the register if they are no longer involved in regulated work.

We have had quite a few changes in our employees (see also the café report). Lee Hoy was concerned that his benefits might be adversely affected so reluctantly gave up his post as caretaker. We are grateful for his time with us.



Kitty Murray, who worships with us, has taken on the duties with help from her husband, Chris, from Monday to Wednesday including dealing with setting out Toddlers and the Haven. David Weir took on the weekend parties until he obtained other employment and we are looking for someone to take that on.


It was also agreed that we would employ an Administrator for the church. We applied for Church of Scotland funding but were not successful. However private funding has been obtained and we are now advertising the post. It was agreed that we need to have a clear sickness absence policy and this has been worked on.

We also started to investigate if we might assist the Mission to Seamen in their ministry to cruise liner crew members. This is ongoing and we hope that a representative of the Mission will come to explain to the congregation what is involved.

We also began to consider how we might improve the church's website. The problem is that we do not have anyone with the relevant experience, and will need help.

As can be seen, the business of the Session is varied and extensive. I know that I am speaking for many when I say that we look forward to meeting together and the spirit of love and kindness which we find in the meetings gives us much encouragement for our congregation going forward. We are indebted to Peter for fostering this among us. We are united in the desire to be used by God and to fulfil His calling of us. We do not know what this will entail or what the future holds but we trust God in this.

Finance and Stewardship

The past year has been challenging financially for our Church. Over the past twelve months our cash outflow was (£24,800).

Our Offerings, and related Gift Aid, dropped by £2,979 to £61,616. This is still a significantly positive amount, but with increasing costs facing our Church we pray that it can be increased. Use of our Premises also showed lower income at £6,238 and Bequests were significantly down on last year's figure which benefited from Georgie Orme's generous amount.

Repairs and Maintenance costs to our buildings were again significant, at £17,394 which included a new boiler for the Church costing £6,700. Other operating costs were similar to 2023, allowing for inflation.

Our Cafe, which had such a successful 2023, struggled last year. Two changes of manager didn't help, with the associated added cost, and sales were 11% lower. Overall the deficit was £13,054, and this included the purchase of a new coffee making machine costing £3,882. We pray that the new team of Liesanne (Manager) and Rosanne (Assistant) can both improve the financial performance, but do so whilst increasing the popularity of this our biggest Outreach activity.

On a more positive note our Youth Worker donations benefitted from two major donations to help us fund this activity into 2025.

The placing of Georgie Orme's bequest, and other funds, into a Church of Scotland deposit account has helped to increase our income from Interest and Dividends by £4,023 to £6,422 for the year.

Gift Aid remains a vital element within our overall Church income. Alister is our H.M.R.C. Gift Aid expert and his timeous submission of claims has already ensured January 2025 has benefitted with £15,278 banked.

Our closing bank balances at the year end dropped to £133,876, but our Church of Scotland Growth and Income Fund investments increased in value to £102,928. Overall then our reserve strength of £236,804 is comforting, but we need to be mindful of annual erosion of this position.

Once again I would like to most sincerely thank our Treasurer, Alister Greig, for the considerable time which he diligently spends keeping all aspects of our finances accurately up to date.

There will be an Annual Stated Meeting of the congregation on Monday the 26th May, when there will be an opportunity to ask questions about the 2024 Congregational Accounts.

Fabric Report

The fabric of the church and manse is inspected regularly, and any issues are dealt with promptly.

Church: during 2024, the gas boiler was replaced, and light bulbs were replaced as required for those spotlights not already replaced by LED fittings. A faulty switch in the Little Lights Room was repaired, and the strip light in a storage cupboard in same room was replaced with an LED strip light at the same time. We have had to find a new contractor to undertake the bi-annual PAT testing of electrical appliances. The fire extinguishers were tested and meet current safety standards, and routine servicing of the fire and intruder alarms has been conducted through the year in accordance with existing contractual agreements. A repair was carried out on the Chancel platform.

We replaced the coffee machine in the kitchen/café and a new fly screen was fitted to one of the kitchen windows.

The Session Clerk was nominated as Health & Safety Administrator.

Our grateful thanks to Jeanette's husband Billy for undertaking regular maintenance issues such as changing lightbulbs and ensuring the safety of the café chairs.

After much negotiation we have persuaded the new factors of the flats above part of the church building that the title insurance provisions for a common policy should be adhered to. Hopefully this will be achieved soon.

There is a substantial willow tree at the east side of the church which overhangs neighbouring properties and is becoming difficult to maintain. When last approached, the Local Authority refused permission to fell it or effect significant alterations. It is intended to re-submit the case for removal in 2025.

Manse: in 2024, the internal redecoration and fitting of new blinds in the manse conservatory was undertaken.

All in all, 2024 was a busy but relatively uneventful year and, happily, our pest control measures have ensured no visitations from the local mice population.


Peter, our minister, as well as delivering his Sunday sermon, also produces a shortened version as Thought for the Week which goes out with the weekly update. A


The Prayer App continues to be of help and support to many in the congregation and lets those facing challenges know that they have the support, prayers and love of the congregation surrounding them.

20th Leith Boys' Brigade

Over the course of 2024, the 20th Leith Boys Brigade unit had an Anchors section (5-8 yrs), a Junior section (8-11 yrs), a Company section (11-14 yrs) and a Senior section (14-18 yrs). In the Anchors and Juniors there have been nine Boys attending, and in the Company and Seniors there have been ten Boys attending this year, with good regular attendance that makes planning activities easier.

All Boys' Brigade sections follow a programme which seeks to have a balanced approach to activities that cover the following themes.

- ◆ Get Active
- ◆ Get Adventurous
- ◆ Get Creative
- ◆ Get into the Bible
- ◆ Get Involved
- ◆ Get Learning

For the Anchors and Juniors the weekly session starts with inspection followed by the a physically active warm up game - usually Dodgeball. After that there will be an activity which is based around one of the six themes above, perhaps using something like a craft or quiz to help the Boys learn about a particular topic, some of which have included healthy hearts, fitness and the parable of the mustard seed. The session finishes with Rev Bluett meeting the boys for a short Bible story, chat and prayer.

Particular highlights through the year was a visit from Cool Creatures, where the boys had the opportunity to meet and to handle some weird and wonderful creatures, including an armadillo, a blue tongued skink and a Burmese python!

For the Company and Senior section, the programme has covered a diverse range of topics, including Healthy Habits, Invictus Games, Youth Culture, Difficult Journeys, Fake News and a South African Theme Night (which unfortunately Rev Bluett was not able to attend).



Games also form a popular part of the Company and Senior sections' sessions, from the perennially favourite Dodgeball and Unihoc to the newly introduced "4-Square", which became very competitive. However, the favourite activity was when we joined with over 90 Boys from across the Edinburgh Battalion area for a Christmas night at Cosmo World Buffet.

We are delighted that we have two Boys currently working towards our BB Advanced Awards, one for the President's Badge and one for the newly re-named King's Badge, which we hope to be able to award next year.

While we are delivering a good programme that keeps the Boys coming weekly, additional adult help would always be welcomed to ensure that there is sufficient Leaders each week.

Re-belonging

It was over a coffee at the tail end of 2023 that Peter, our minister, and I got to talking about the importance of nurturing faith through small group discussions. It was soon evident that we both shared a vision of a course for Newhaven Church that would serve as an introduction to the Bible and the Christian faith, and also an opportunity for us to share the faith journey we were on. And so it was that God planted the seed.

Over the next several months, God watered that seed and it grew into the course that we launched in August 2024 – Re-belonging: the Story of the Christian Faith.

The timing was providential and evidence of God's involvement. There had been a clear sense of God's presence at previous Sunday morning services and this prompted several folk in our congregation to respond to the invitation we put out - Do you want more of God in your life? Do you want to engage more with the Bible? Or are you perhaps just curious to explore the Christian faith, even just a little bit.

Re-belonging: the Story of the Christian Faith is a series of 12 sessions that tell the story of the Christian faith as we discover it in the Bible. It covers the key points in that story but also encourages exploration of the themes of the Christian faith. These themes will help to join the different dots of that story from thousands of years ago. And it is hoped that these themes would help reveal God in the present, and the connection between God and each of us, right now, wherever we are.

The course was called Re-belonging because we believe that each and every person, without any exceptions, belongs in God's story. In fact, we believe that each and every person has always belonged in God's story, whether they know it or not, whether they have a faith or none.


There were two groups who met fortnightly, with 11 people in total, in addition to Peter and me. Although everyone knew each other beforehand, at least by sight from Sunday morning services, over the course of the meetings people got to know each other more. It was wonderful to see relationships being built as we shared stories, asked questions and explored the one relationship that transcends everything – the relationship God longs to have with each of us.

Amongst the groups there is some interest in continuing to meet on a regular basis, and so we are giving thought to how that might be done.

The 12 sessions of Re-belonging are set out below. If reading this stirs the heart of anyone who wasn't on the course then please let me know – I would hope we might run the Re-belonging course again in 2025.

2024 was a year filled with blessings from the Lord. We were able to carry out a number of events which conveyed the Good News.

Messy Church

Our first Messy Church of the year was held on 2nd February. We celebrated the fact that we are all different and unique. We are God's masterpieces. Singing the song 'Build it up' from Fischy music emphasised the importance of us building one another up even if we are different. The crafts included the dove of peace, decorating people cutouts and making drums. The drums were then used to accompany our singing of our worship songs.



Our Easter Messy church took place on 29th March. The format was different as everyone was involved in the journey of Easter. The Easter journey covered Palm Sunday, the Last Supper, the Crucifixion and the Resurrection. This involved everyone moving around the church building and actively participating in the different parts of the story.

Each family constructed their own resurrection garden which they then took home. The egg and spoon race was again enjoyed by children and adults.



Bruce Lockhart from SU arrived on 19th April with all sorts of circus equipment providing us with an interesting afternoon where we were able to learn and hone in on circus skills. We all had the opportunity to use stilts, ride a unicycle, spin plates, juggle balls and or hats. The juggling, parachute and ball games were also great fun.

The pre-schoolers' Messy Church on 19th May was based on the creation. The children started by doing a scavenger hunt outside. The children and families then spent time listening to Scruffy talk about the creation, which involved taking things out of his bag and helping him find the hidden animals in the room. Christine and Scruffy chatted about all the wonderful things that God has created for us. The little ones each made a booklet, which they took home, to remember all the beautiful things in creation. At snack time

after making faces with their pancakes and fruit, the children enjoyed eating them.

We looked at the story of Jesus walking on the water at the Messy Church on 21st June. We discussed how important it is to keep our eyes focused on Jesus and to have faith that He will be with us during our difficult times. The children enjoyed making goo bags, decorating biscuits, making horses from craft sticks and working out the optic illusion message.



The number of people attending Messy church varies. There have been times where approximately 50 people have attended.

Holiday club

At the start of the summer holiday we partnered up with Leith Baptist and City on the Hill churches and held our annual holiday club from 1st to 5th July. This year we had a fantastic response of 58 children registering.

The focus of the holiday club was on Jesus the restorer. We explored, through drama and video clips, bible stories looking at how Jesus restores us emotionally, spiritually and physically. During group time the children discussed the stories, there was time for questions and reflective prayer.

Every day a guest speaker explained to the children how they restore things/ people in everyday situations. On the second day the children were



shown some basic first aid steps by Alister. The children then had fun seeing how many bandages they could use to bandage their group leader resulting in some interesting looking mummies.

The children's creativity was really shown during craft time. A firm favourite activity during the holiday club was archery. The children also enjoyed the various games and messy challenges.



At the end of everyday the families with their children and the team enjoyed a picnic style lunch.

Other activities

At the start of the year Christine and I with Heather from SU had the privilege of presenting **Bible Alive** to the P6 children at Wardie Primary. The response from the children and teachers was positive.

Our annual **Inflatables Day** was held on 23rd March. This event provides an opportunity for us to build relationships with the community. We had a fantastic turn out and all the children enjoyed the day.

Our first **Holiday Club Afternoon Tea fundraiser** was held on Sunday 28th April. A lovely afternoon of socialising and eating tasty treats. We collected an amazing amount of £834 which went towards the family lunches during the holiday club.

It is encouraging to see more people participating in the All age services. These intergenerational services are a blessing.

Back to School with God service held on Sunday 1st September. There were 18 different educational places represented at the service.. The focus was to spot the difference that Jesus makes on our lives. It was great to get some new people involved with leading up front.



Brian and I are running our Youth Group (P7-S3) meetings on Sundays. We meet during the church service. This is a time where teens are free to ask questions and explore their faith and the Bible in a safe and relaxing environment.

We have continued with our partnership with Victoria Primary School. At the start of the year I carried on working with the P7, after the summer holidays I began working with the P6 children, helping the pupils who find mathematics and or reading a challenge. Christine and Susan also help out at the school.

In December the P6 pupils at Victoria Primary enjoyed the **Christmas programme** that I did with them. The pupils had some interesting and profound questions. There was a positive response from the pupils and teachers. It's a blessing to be able to share the true story of Christmas with the pupils.

I have worked with some of our children from the congregation who needed assistance with their Maths.

Our **Christmas Extravaganza** which took place on Saturday 14th December was once again a huge success. The children enjoyed the crafts, games and party food.


Using the tardis, the children were able to be actively involved in the Christmas story. 'Time traveling' gave the children an opportunity to hear how the different people in the Christmas story must have felt and what they experienced.



We made little bead bees over a few weeks to remind us that Jesus said to be "Bee" different



Looking to the future, I hope it will continue to flourish and bring new people in to enjoy the drink and food, the friendly faces, and on a cold winter's day, warmth.

It is a place where people can feel at home, others can gain work experience through volunteering and this can lead to paid employment. At that time, we had two young café assistants, Tamsin and

Amy. They worked on different days because of University and other commitments and so were not in a position to take on the manager's role. We advertised and Bea Green came along. As she herself said, she had no catering experience but was willing to give it ago. This proved to be a valuable but short time solution as it provided the bridge between Sandra and the current manager Liesanne Craib. During the summer both Tamsin and Amy moved on. Tamsin moved further away from the church and wanted to avoid travelling long distances and Amy wanted to pursue her career in archaeology and film. We are grateful to both of them for all they gave to the café and their dedication. At this point Rosanne Lau came on the scene and became the café assistant. It has been a joy to see her grow into the job and I am amazed at all the work she gets through.



During the year various problems emerged and there was difficulty getting volunteers to serve drinks. However, this and also the increasing unreliability of the old coffee machine led to us purchasing a new model which is not only easier for volunteers to operate but is also much quicker and helps us avoid queues at busy times. We are grateful to Georgie Orme's bequest for providing the funding.

Towards the end of the year, and due to other commitments, Bea resigned as café manager. While her tenure was short, it was also vital for the café in enabling us to continue to operate during 2024 which otherwise would not have been possible. We are most grateful to her for her courage in taking on a role with which she was not familiar and also for enabling us to continue to serve the community. Bea was someone who always had time to talk to the customers which is an essential part of the duties of Café Manager.

During November Liesanne started and took over as manager in mid December. In her first week on her own she had a funeral tea to cater for and she restarted the outside and special catering service that we had previously offered.

We are glad now to have a stable team in place and we look forward to Liesanne and Rosanne taking the ministry forward in 2025.




Timothy's school report stated that he 'meets expectations' in English, Maths, Kiswahili, Religious Education, Agriculture, Social Studies and Integrated science.

Kampi Child Care Centre

Throughout 2024 Newhaven Church maintained its longstanding connection with the Child Care Centre at Kampi Ya Samaki in rural Kenya, through the church's support of Kampi Disabled Children's Trust.

Kampi Disabled Children's Trust is a UK based trust which was established by our late friend and Newhaven member Georgie Orme, shortly after she retired from working in Kampi. The Trust provides financial support to the Child Care Centre but has no involvement in the day-to-day operation of the Centre.

The Child Care Centre has a new manager, Stephen Loktari (known as Panga), who himself was a child at the Centre. Rosemary Gilmore, one of the Trustees of Kampi Disabled Children's Trust and who herself worked with Georgie Orme at the Centre, remembers him well as 'one of her boys'. She visited Kampi late in 2023, spending time with Panga, and was thrilled to see his strong faith and clear desire to help and to be an advocate for disabled young people.

There are 15 children at the Child Care Centre where they live during school term, are treated with medication and supplied with equipment and from where they go to the school that is very close by. There are three teachers

at the Centre who specialise in working with children with disabilities and this helps to ensure that each child receives personalised attention and can learn effectively.

The Centre has a Bible club for the children where they can grow spiritually and deepen their understanding of God's word as they actively participate in the club's activities. There is also a devotional programme for the staff, which fosters an atmosphere of faith and encouragement among the dedicated team.

The Trustees of Kampi Disabled Children's Trust decided in 2024 not to seek funds from its two principal donors, one of which is Newhaven Church.


The funds held by the Trust are currently sufficient to cover several years' support to the Child Care Centre and the Trustees felt that it would not be wise to continue to seek the same level of support from the principal donors. This was the principal reason for not holding the usual Newhaven Church ceilidh at the end of November.

Some of the children at the Kampi Child Care Centre




Men's Group (aka Dad's Army)

Presbytery Report

2024 was my second full year as Edinburgh and West Lothian Presbytery Elder on behalf of Newhaven Church, and my role followed a similar pattern to the previous year of attending the meetings of Presbytery at Palmerston Place Church and reporting back to the Kirk Session anything that impacted our congregation or was of general interest in the workings of the wider Church. There were six meetings in total throughout the year. Whilst Presbytery Elders have the opportunity to serve on the various groups and/or committees of Presbytery I am unfortunately unable to give the time to these and have therefore given the appropriate apologies and been excused.

As was the case during 2023, few of the items of business that arose during the year affected Newhaven directly, nevertheless the meetings let one see the considerable amount of work undertaken in the background on behalf of congregations within the Presbytery area by Ministers and Elders who do serve on the various Committee Groups. These Groups submit reports as applicable to each member of Presbytery and comprise Faith Nurture; Faith Impact; Resources; Deployment (which deals with the Presbytery Plan and Unions); Finance; Property and the Nominations Committee. Thankfully, all the relevant papers and reports from each is circulated in advance of each meeting thus shortening the length of time going over each of these, normally during the evenings being a case of "taken as read" and approved by those present.

There is always an opportunity for comments/questions to be raised on the floor, although this is rarely taken up and questions tend to be few. Quite often, there is a speaker slot, most often on behalf of the Faith or Resources committees which can be the highlight of many a meeting! One of the most interesting discussions I heard was taken as a separate meeting in itself, that of the topic "Assisted Dying" which has been very much in the news during 2024 and before. I found this a very interesting discussion which help shape (confirm) my own views on the matter but it must be stated all sides of the argument were aired.

Over the course of the year, the number of Church Unions and Parish Linkages was down over the previous year, at six and three respectively, including the Union of North and South Leith with whom we at Newhaven held discussions and shared Sunday services over a period of time.

There is much information that I have on file from our meetings, so should anyone have any questions about Presbytery please feel free to ask me and I'll do my best to answer.
